




Grade Level News What's Going On Around the School

<u>Preschool</u>—Fall is in the air! And our students are observing the season change through their senses. What a great way to talk about seasons and the weather! During October, we will learn about Fire Safety, and we will meet some fabulous firemen. Thank you for coming to visit us! PreK is also going to Dorr Farms to explore and pick pumpkins from their pumpkin patch. We will also celebrate Red Ribbon Week with special activities planned throughout the week. Our Character Day Parade will be a chance to bring our favorite book and dress up as our favorite storybook character. Fun things are happening in October!

Kindergarten—We have fallen in love with learning in kindergarten as we move into the autumn season! We are showing that we can identify 2D and 3D shapes, characters and setting of a story, and are working on concepts of print. This month, we will be learning all about pumpkins, fire safety, and nocturnal animals. We are also so excited for our upcoming field trip to the pumpkin patch! Parents, please remember to continue checking your child's purple folder each night for any new information. Thank you for all that you do! First Grade— October will be filled with many new and exciting activities in the classroom!! Guided reading instruction began in September. During guided reading, students work in small groups and the Reading Interventionist (Mrs. Alexander) also reads with some students for a portion of their guided reading time. During math, students have been practicing strategies to add and subtract. We have learned about doubles, near doubles, and the commutative property for addition. We will continue learning about light and sound in science. We will continue learning about community helpers, our rights and responsibilities and how to be a good citizen during social studies. It is hard to believe that the first nine weeks is almost over. Please continue to practice the

spelling words daily and discuss the patterns found in words. We encourage students to find patterns in words...if I can spell the word "like" then I can spell the word "bike." This will help the students as they become fluent readers and writers this year. It is also important for the students to practice writing at home. Remind them to write complete sentences and use both capitalization and punctuation correctly. Lastly, please encourage your child to listen carefully during class time and to follow Knights RULE at all




times. We are excited about our field trip to the Pumpkin Patch later this month. Thank you again for your support at home.

Second Grade—Fall is here and we are beginning to settle into our routines in 2nd grade! We are hard at work in all subjects! In reading we have read 3 different genres of text: realistic fiction, informational, and poetry. We have learned how to identify story elements, find the main idea of a text, and ask questions about our reading. In math we have started our unit on place value. We wrapped up our unit on matter in September and are now moving on to learning about our interactions with the world in social studies. We encourage you to send in water bottles and jackets with students daily. Water bottles are great for after recess and although it is still warm out, our classrooms can get chilly during the day. Please check folders, backpacks and class dojo daily for updates and messages from school!

Third Grade—October is here and third graders are being armored with their Kingsbury Knights RULE Expectation Gear to help make 2023-2024 an Exceptional Year! In ELA, we are continuing to implement strategies to help students develop daily habits of reading, writing, and working independently for a lifetime of literacy independence. Students are focusing on developing and organizing how-to articles, identifying the main idea of informational text, word study, and reading comprehension. In math, we are continuing to become more fluent in multiplication. In science, we will begin our unit on weather. In social studies, we will begin our unit on the Environment and People. Students will discover how people interact within the environment overtime.

Fourth Grade—Wow! What a start for the new school year! We can't believe it's already October! The fourth graders are working so hard and learning many new things. In math, students are refreshing their addition and subtraction skills up to the millions. Also in math, students will begin multiplying a four-digit number by a one-digit number and multiplying a two-digit number by a two-digit number. Please make sure your child is fluent in their multiplication facts! 99Math is a free website that children can go to, to freshen up on their facts! In science, we are beginning our study on weather. In ELA, the students will be working on analyzing text structures and text features. Each class will also be reading a class selected novel. In social studies we will begin our study of Colonization of America and Early Explorers. Please make sure your child is reading at home daily. Always check Class dojo for daily updates from your child's teacher!

Fifth Grade—The first quarter is quickly coming to an end. The second quarter is right around the corner and the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays are quickly approaching. As we roll into the holiday season, we are continuing to persevere in each one of our subjects. In math, we will be studying algebraic expressions and coordinate planes and are moving on to patterns in multiplication and multiplying and dividing whole numbers. In science we will be discovering landforms and how each landform was uniquely formed in nature. In social studies we are continuing onward with Westward Expansion. The students will learn all the aspects of the United States expanding Westward to the Pacific Ocean. Students are really enjoying seeing how history has shaped the world we know today.


